In 2024, SCL was a key partner in projects designed to grow skills, food awareness and community along with some fabulous garden produce in rural Strathcona.

We continued to collaborate with the Ardrossan Recreation & Agricultural Society (ARAS) throughout the growing season on the ARAS Community Growing Patch. Community members are encouraged to get hands-on in this cooperative garden, to share learning and share in the bounty. This garden also grows leaders! It welcomes volunteers of all ages, has a system in place to particularly encourage local youngsters to get involved.

Last year, the library hosted presenters on topics from beekeeping to worm composting to Knowledge Keeper Chantelle Gray of Mâskwa Medicine, who introduced traditional Indigenous ways for working with the land. Produce from the ARAS Garden Patch was harvested and available for sale at the weekly Ardrossan Farmers' Market, with leftovers going to the Strathcona Food Bank.

We also partnered with the **Colchester & District Agricultural Society** and **Colchester Community League** on the **Grow Your Own** program series. This project brought together gardeners from beginner to expert levels to help people learn how to create a sustainable food supply for their families. Community members connected over a joint meal to learn and share ideas.

SCL + Heart and Stroke Foundation, Strathcona County Emergency Services Offered the "Cardiac Crash" program for seniors in rural Strathcona.


SCL + Mattamy Homes
